Yonnondio is an Iroquois term that expresses a lament for the native people of America. I discovered it in a collection of poetry written by Walt Whitman, a true egalitarian who grasped not only his individuality, but also his interconnection with all of humanity. "Of every hue and caste am I," he wrote, "of every rank and religion."

As our modern world has grown more socially fragmented, we can observe humanity's loss of harmony with the land and sense the gradual disappearance of innocence from our lives. Yet, I believe, we can also perceive a new willingness to live in a simpler but wiser world.

Using new words, I have adapted Yonnondio to convey a sense of reconciliation and renewal rather than despair. Using music, I have retraced its imagery to express a personal belief that the greatest discoveries that lie before us will not involve science, technology or progress, rather, they will embrace forgiveness, compassion and understanding.
